Mayoral Midterm Review

As we reach the midpoint of our term, Deputy Mayor Raj Sandhu and I are proud to celebrate the remarkable achievements of our council in building a vibrant and livable community. Our focus has extended beyond housing to encompass the creation of a complete community that truly meets the diverse needs of our residents. Together, we have made significant strides in land donations that support future growth, completed a comprehensive organizational review to enhance our operations, and prioritized community safety initiatives to ensure a secure environment for all. Our commitment to recreation is evident in the development of a Leisure Master Plan and numerous park upgrades, enriching the quality of life for our residents. We are also actively engaged in ongoing discussions surrounding the Bradford Bypass, recognizing its importance for our community's connectivity and economic development. We look forward to continuing this journey together, celebrating our progress, and building an even brighter future for everyone.

Two of our most significant achievements this term includes the donation of land for a new high school and the future expansion of the Danube Senior Centre. Securing land for the high school is a crucial step in addressing the educational needs of our growing community. This generous donation not only reflects a strong commitment to our youth but also lays the foundation for a vibrant learning environment. By investing in our educational infrastructure today, we are setting the stage for a stronger future,

equipping our young residents with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive. This initiative underscores our dedication to supporting families and enhancing the overall quality of life in our community. If all approvals go smoothly, we anticipate construction could begin as early as 2026.

The second significant land donation ensures we can expand programming offerings for the seniors of BWG. With the increasing demand for these essential services, we are delighted to support this growth while maintaining uninterrupted service for our current seniors. We are immensely grateful to our development community for their generous donations and continued support of our town. Together, we are building a promising future for all residents, young and old.

To enhance our operational efficiency, we initiated an Organizational Review in December 2023. This vital initiative aims to streamline our processes, enabling us to serve our residents more effectively. Since 2002, our town has evolved significantly in size, composition, and structure to meet the changing landscape of municipal service delivery. This evolution has been driven by growth-related demands, new programs, and additional responsibilities stemming from shifts in provincial policy and the Simcoe County official plan. With a projected population of approximately 84,000 by 2051, it is imperative for Bradford West Gwillimbury and other municipalities in Simcoe County to update our long-term plans accordingly.

Organizational reviews are essential for identifying inefficiencies and areas for improvement within our municipal services. By conducting a comprehensive evaluation of our operations, we can streamline processes, reduce redundancies, and enhance interdepartmental communication. This approach not only optimizes resource allocation but also ensures that residents receive timely and effective services. Ultimately, our goal is to create a more responsive and accessible government, fostering better engagement and delivering tangible benefits for our community members. We are committed to implementing the insights gained from this review to enhance the quality of service we provide to our residents.

Community safety remains a top priority for our residents, and we are excited to share the great progress we've made to enhance it through initiatives like Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) and the Traffic Mitigation Strategy (TMS), which are helping to ensure safer streets for everyone. We are enthusiastic about the positive impacts we're already seeing—reduced speeds and safer conditions on our roads. Council has committed to reinvesting any proceeds generated by the ASE program into further traffic safety initiatives, providing direct benefits to our taxpayers.

As our community continues to grow, so does the need to accommodate increased traffic flows and ensure the safety of all road users. Recognizing this, Council has placed

community safety and traffic Congestion as its number one priority within our Strategic Priorities. The Strategic Initiatives Committee is actively working on improving pedestrian pathways and implementing traffic calming measures throughout the town, reinforcing our commitment to creating a safer environment.

To effectively address traffic concerns, we developed the Traffic Mitigation Strategy (TMS). This comprehensive document offers a data-driven, technical process that employs industry best practices to respond to traffic safety issues. The TMS outlines a clear framework for evaluating, prioritizing, implementing, and monitoring traffic requests submitted by residents and stakeholders. Its technical criteria and detailed descriptions of each step ensure that our decision-making is well-informed, transparent, and based on solid data.

Crucially, this strategy was developed through a collaborative effort involving Council, residents and town staff. Community engagement was a key component of the process, with residents participating throughout the study, including at three Public Information Centres (PICs). The insights gathered from these groups provided invaluable guidance in shaping the TMS. We are currently finalizing the release of the TMS, which will be available on the Town's website. We are thrilled to share the progress made on our Leisure Master Plan, which identified 39 recommendations aimed at enhancing our community's recreational spaces. One of the most significant steps forward is our commitment to securing future green fields through to 2051, addressing the anticipated growth of our population to 84,000. By purchasing additional green spaces, we are proactively ensuring that we can meet the recreational demands of our expanding community.

Our investments in park upgrades and infrastructure improvements across multiple wards are already making a visible impact. Here are some notable updates that highlight our dedication to creating vibrant recreational areas for all:

Celebration Square: With winter approaching, our contractors are working tirelessly to install the flatwork concrete

before the cold sets in. Subgrade preparation is nearly complete, and work on the stage structure will begin shortly. The site is beginning to take shape, featuring beautiful concrete planting beds that double as seating, a water play feature, and a multipurpose stage structure. We anticipate project completion by spring 2025!

Lotto Park (Bradford East): This exciting addition in the southeast corner of Bradford is progressing well, with foundations for the chain-link screening around the multipurpose sports courts already in place, as is the playground. Stay tuned for the completion date!

Luxury Park: True to its name, Luxury Park is undergoing significant renovations. Nearing completion, we're excited to see tree planting, trail asphalting, and sod installation in the coming weeks, followed by final grading and garden bed enhancements.



Bill Marks Trail: We recently completed major upgrades to the entire south side of the trail network, featuring widened asphalt that meets accessibility standards. New sod has been laid, and our contractors are diligently addressing any remaining deficiencies.

Bond Head Northwest: We're finalizing drawings and details in preparation to issue tenders for construction to begin in spring 2025. This project will feature unique armour stone retaining walls, accessible play structures, and ample open areas for active play.

Legion Park: This year, we replaced curbs and safety surfacing to complement the new shade structure and concrete pad installed in 2023. These improvements have revitalized Legion Park, enhancing accessibility and comfort for all users.

Brookfield Parkette: A new shade structure has been designed and implemented to replace the old pergola, completed in spring 2024, providing much-needed comfort for park visitors.

Henderson Sports Storage Building: To better serve user groups at Henderson fields, we're installing a concrete pad for an 8' x 36' storage shed, equipped with three rolling doors, ensuring easy access for local soccer associations.

Civic Centre: On October 7, the Strategic Initiatives Committee made significant decisions about the proposed facility, marking the transition from conceptual planning to design development. The consulting team will soon begin drafting and conducting workshops to refine the facility's design.

177 Church Community Hub: After much anticipation, the commercial kitchen at 177 Church has been completed and certified, ready for use. Tenants continue their fit-ups as this space evolves into its final form.

Joe Magani Diamond 6: Ongoing conversations with The Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) regarding the Environmental Impact Study and preliminary design for a sixth diamond at Joe Magani Park are progressing, despite the complexities posed by the site's environmental features. We hope to see construction begin in 2025.

Road Improvements: The recent repaving of 8th Line and Reagen's Industrial Rd has greatly improved access for both residents and local businesses.

Together, these initiatives are a testament to our commitment to building a thriving community with accessible and enjoyable recreational spaces. We look forward to seeing our vision come to life as we continue to work hand-in-hand with residents to create a vibrant, active environment for all.

Our collaboration with the province is driving forward the Bradford Bypass project, an essential initiative aimed at alleviating congestion and improving traffic flow throughout our community. This project is crucial for enhancing connectivity and overall quality of life for our residents, and we couldn't be more excited about the future it promises!

We recognize that the ongoing construction in our community has posed challenges for commuters, and we truly empathize with the frustrations that come with temporary disruptions. 

Councillor Duhaney is thrilled to see the many improvements throughout her ward and the rest of BWG over the first half of Council's term. From the completion of the Southwest Arterial Roads project to new youth initiatives, Duhaney is proud to see the positive changes taking shape throughout BWG.

Community and Traffic Safety

Traffic and safety measures continue in Ward 1. An all-way stop sign and crosswalk has been installed at the intersection of Miller Park Avenue and Sutherland Avenue. Additionally, a three-way stop at Aishford Road and Sutherland Avenue has been installed in an effort to enhance pedestrian safety and manage traffic in the area.

Youth and Community Engagement

This spring, Councillor Duhaney proposed a motion to create a Youth Council in BWG, which has since been approved! The Town is excited to announce the formation of its first Youth Council Advisory Committee, composed of youth residents who are eager to make a difference in their community. Join the Committee for their inaugural meeting on November 20 and get the opportunity to engage with emerging leaders and empower their involvement in local governance.

Regional Representation and Advocacy

In August, Councillor Duhaney was elected to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Board to represent the Small Urban Caucus. This is an exciting opportunity for Duhaney to advocate for our community at the provincial level and promote policies that benefit small urban areas like ours.

Councillor Duhaney remains committed to advocating for safety initiatives within her ward and the community, as well as being a champion for youth opportunities and programming throughout BWG.



Councillor Scott is excited to share the work being done throughout Ward 2 and beyond. From public transit improvements to new schools, and upgrades to our parks, the Town is focused on ensuring its residents have access to quality public services that enhance their daily lives.

Park Upgrades

Quality public parks are essential to creating a vibrant community, providing space for recreation, relaxation, and gathering. Over the summer, the Town continued investing in public spaces that enrich our community. Luxury Park saw significant upgrades, and the new Bradford East Lotto Park in Ward 2 is under construction, complete with multi-use sports courts, playgrounds, and more. Upgrades continued at Legion Park, and the new Youth Centre at Lions Park is a hit with our local teens.

Public Transit

The Town is enhancing public transit with a new Master Plan focused on accessibility and affordability. Over the next few years, the Town will add ten new buses, expand routes, and introduce employment shuttles, while keeping fares low at one dollar per ride. Additionally, Metrolinx is nearing completion with the final upgrades to the GO station parking lot underway.

Education

Council has made great strides toward securing a second public high school. The Town is currently reviewing a developer's proposal to donate land for a new school, has secured expansions for the Catholic high school, and are advocating for new elementary schools. Quality education is a cornerstone of a strong community, and BWG is working to ensure our students have just that.

Community and Traffic Safety

We've introduced new speed mitigation measures to keep our streets safe, especially in the area of Colborne Street and St. Marie of the Incarnation Catholic School.

Road Construction and Rehabilitation

After two years of construction, the Southwest Arterial Roads (SWAR) Project is officially complete. Sideroad 10 and Line 5 between Holland Street and the Line 5 interchange was rebuilt, a new roundabout was installed at Sideroad 10 and Line 6, and Fraser Creek underwent stormwater management upgrades with the addition of two new culverts. Pedestrian access along Line 6 was also improved with a newly lit pathway. Additionally, streetlights are up and running at the curved intersection of Sideroad 10 and Line 5. The completion of these projects has greatly improved traffic flow, and pedestrian access in the area.

Community and Traffic Safety

Traffic safety has been a top Council priority from the get-go. During the first rotation of the ASE pilot program, speed cameras were installed on Line 7, between Lallien Drive and Dixon Road to help calm traffic in the area.

Protecting our Planet

BWG remains committed to protecting its wetlands. With grant funding from the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP),

Community and Traffic Safety

Councillor Giordano remains steadfast in his efforts to enhance community and traffic safety in BWG. After seeing great success with the new ASE pilot project, Councillor Giordano brought forward a motion to ensure that the revenue generated from the project is prioritized for speed mitigation measures in Town. The motion passed, with council supporting the commitment of ASE proceeds to help curb speeding along key streets within the Traffic Mitigation Strategy guidelines. The Strategy aims to address longstanding speeding concerns on BWG's busiest routes, offering permanent solutions like speed humps and curb extensions that slow traffic effectively.

Enhancements to the pick-up and dropoff Zones at Bradford District High and Fieldcrest Elementary are now complete, and a new accessible pedestrian ramp has been installed at the intersection of Professor Day Drive and Blue Dasher Boulevard. These measures have been critical to provide safe access to students and pedestrians throughout Ward 4.

Community Engagement

Councillor Giordano and his team hosted the 3rd Annual Retro Street Party in the Summerlyn neighbourhood. The beloved gathering was a huge success, marking yet another memorable event for the community. As the original and largest (non-town hosted) street party in BWG's history, the celebration brought residents



together for a nostalgic day filled with music, inflatable games, and lively activities that included Councillor Giordano's Band as well as local celebrities, Joee, and the Cara Lea Band.

This year, the event reached new heights, raising an impressive \$10,000, with funds earmarked specifically for purchasing wholesale goods from the local No Frills. The partnership with No Frills not only supports the community by providing essential goods at discounted rates but also strengthens the local economy by keeping contributions within BWG. The funds raised by the Retro Street Party, the neighbourhood attendees, and the amazing local sponsors helped us hit over \$25,000 in two years' worth of food for the Bradford Helping Hand Foodbank.

The party's success is a testament to the dedication and community spirit that makes Ward 4 unique. This annual celebration has gained popularity and influence, raising the bar for community engagement in BWG for years to come.

Community and Traffic Safety

The first half of Council's term saw major efforts toward traffic mitigation in BWG. The launch of the ASE pilot project has been a huge success, helping calm traffic and increase pedestrian safety on some of our busiest roads. Councillor Ferragine is happy to see the positive impact that the ASE project has had throughout Town and his ward and looks forward to ensuring additional traffic safety measures are implemented over the remainder of his term.

Park Upgrades

This summer, Councillor Ferragine was excited to see residents enjoying the newly updated Henderson Memorial Community Park. Significant upgrades were made to the Ward 5 park over the first half of term including the addition of a new 2400 square foot pavilion equipped with water access, hydro and a barbecue. The Town is excited to share that the pavilion is now a permittable space that residents can rent out for private gatherings of up to 100 people. Ferragine is excited about the advancements to one of BWG's busiest parks and looks forward to seeing families and community members utilizing all that Henderson Memorial Community Park has to offer.

BWG has been working closely with the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority to evaluate the possibility of adding another baseball diamond at Joe Magani Park. The Town is currently awaiting approval for the detailed design with hopes to begin tendering in 2025.

Councillor Ferragine looks forward to ensuring further safety and community initiatives over the remainder of this term and is excited to be a part of the future of BWG.

Park Upgrades


The revitalization of the Bill Marks Trail is now complete. Over the summer the Town removed and replaced the existing asphalt trail with a sloped and wider trail to help improve water drainage and accessibility of the greenspace. Councillor Harper was happy to see residents in his ward utilizing the newly improved trail and looks forward to being a champion for more upgrades throughout BWG.

Community and Traffic Safety

Traffic mitigation strategies are a key focus in Ward 6, where enhancing safety and reducing speeding are paramount. The ASE pilot project underwent its second rotation at the end of the summer and speed cameras were activated on Fletcher Street, between Church Street and Barrie Street, to help manage and calm traffic in this busy area. These measures aim to deter speeding and promote safer driving behaviors.

Ward 6 has seen other important traffic calming measures take place over the first half of this term. The installation of speed humps on Northgate Drive and Veterans Street have been critical to ensuring resident safety. Furthermore, traffic lights are up and running at the intersection of Professor Day Drive and Line 8, significantly improving safety by regulating the flow of vehicles and pedestrians. Resident safety is a top priority in BWG, and Councillor Harper remains committed to advocating for solutions to tackle this ongoing issue.

As Councillor Harper looks ahead to the second half of his term, he is eager to build on the progress made and is dedicated to continuing to make positive changes that drive the community forward.

Residents will soon be able to enjoy many new park features including a shaded area, sports court, paved looping paths, benches, and ample open green space. Councillor Dykie is proud of the Town's efforts to create an open and accessible space for families to enjoy and looks forward to unveiling the newly enhanced Luxury Park in 2025.

Road Construction and Rehabilitation

BWG continues its investment toward improving roadway and water systems along Miller Park Avenue, Davey Boulevard, Agar Avenue, and part of Melbourne Drive. Nearing its completion, the 2023 Urban Roads project will see important upgrades to road infrastructure in the area with the installation of curbs, sidewalks, and electrical works, as well as a new watermain. These upgrades a significant step toward a better and safer BWG.

Councillor Dykie is enthusiastic about the future of his ward, with several other road upgrades planned. Fred Cook Drive, Luxury Avenue, and Kulpin are just a few roadways that are set to be improved in the second half of council's term.

The committee has also endorsed three major advocacy initiatives. The first is the Right to Repair movement, which seeks to empower consumers by ensuring the availability of parts and repair manuals for electronic devices, significantly reducing electronic waste. This initiative is particularly vital for farmers who rely on the ability to repair complex agricultural equipment on-site.

The second initiative is the Mayor's Monarch Butterfly Pledge, which emphasizes the importance of preserving pollinator populations through the implementation of naturalized landscaping practices.

Finally, the committee is also dedicated to water protection, advocating for substantial investments in the Lake Simcoe watershed. This includes promoting a renewed Lake Simcoe Protection Plan and introducing nature-based solutions to address the cleanup of the Holland River.

In recognition of its impactful efforts, the BWG Green Initiatives Advisory Committee was honoured with the Lake Simcoe Watershed Heroes Award in the Healthy Communities category at the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority's (LSRCA) Conservation Awards. This award highlights the committee's dedication to combatting climate change, protecting natural habitats, and enhancing green spaces.

BWG's Civic Centre on the Horizon

The Strategic Inititatives Advisory Committee is excited to share updates on the evolving plans for Bradford West Gwillimbury's Civic Centre. In early October, design ideas were presented to Council members, sparking discussions on the conceptual framework for the building.

The project will utilize a design-build methodology, which allows for flexibility as details continue to develop. The goal is to issue a tender for the design-build in spring 2025. Key features of the proposed Civic Centre include its orientation along Simcoe Rd, the use of mass timber construction, and the incorporation of a performing arts space alongside recreational facilities such as a fitness studio and gymnasium.

Road Updates

The 2023 Urban Roads Project: Phase 1

Phase 1 saw the replacement of the aging watermain on Agar Ave. and Davey Blvd. New pipes, valves, hydrants, and services were installed, and storm and sanitary sewers were repaired and upgraded. The project also enhanced street lighting with new poles and lights, added sidewalks on Agar Ave. and Davey Blvd., repaired sidewalks on Miller Park Ave., and replaced disturbed grass with fresh sod.

The 2023 Urban Roads Project: Phases 2-3

Currently in the design stage, phases 2 and 3 of the Urban Roads Project aim to further address the aging infrastructure in BWG's older neighborhoods. Key upgrades will involve enhancing the town's watermain system and repairing or replacing identified storm and sanitary sewers. A review of the street lighting system will also be conducted to ensure adequate illumination in all areas.

Holland Street Revitalization: Contract One

Also in its design phase, the Holland Street Revitalization Project is focused on improving aging infrastructure along Mary St., Drury St., Thomas St., and Elizabeth St. This includes upgrading the town's watermain system and repairing or replacing necessary storm and sanitary sewers. The street lighting system will also be assessed to address any areas lacking sufficient lighting

Line 8 Improvements

A Class Environmental Assessment (EA) is underway to plan for traffic and pedestrian safety through 2031. The EA will be completed by the end of 2025 and will guide future design and reconstruction. This summer, the roadway between SR10 and Barrie Street was resurfaced due to asphalt wear, and new traffic signals were installed at Professor Day Drive and Line 8.

SWAR Project

The SWAR project was completed in summer 2024 after two years of construction. It involved reconstructing Sideroad 10 and Line 5 from Holland Street to the Line 5 interchange, installing a new roundabout at SR10 and Line 6, and upgrading stormwater management with twin box culverts at Fraser Creek. A continuous, well-lit pedestrian pathway was also added along Line 6, stretching from Langford Blvd to the roundabout and north to Holland Street.



Budget 2024

LittaTrapTM Pilot Underway in BWG

This spring BWG launched a two-year pilot project to install and maintain LittaTraps, based on a recommendation from the Green Initiatives Advisory Committee that was approved by Council. These traps are designed to catch litter before it enters stormwater drains, helping to protect the West Holland River and, ultimately, Lake Simcoe.


In May, 32 LittaTraps were installed at various locations throughout town. Each trap captures garbage and pollutants larger than 5 mm that flow into stormwater drains during rainfall and snow melt events. Town staff will maintain and monitor the traps to determine cleaning frequency and track the types of waste removed to assess their effectiveness.

"LittaTraps are a simple but effective tool to keep our environment clean. They work by capturing litter before it can pollute our streets and waterways. These innovative retrofits to our older stormwater infrastructure are already showing how they can help keep the Holland River and our neighbourhoods clean." – Jonathan Scott, Ward 2 Councillor and Chair of the Green Initiatives Advisory Committee

The first cleanout and waste audit took place in September 2024, with the next one scheduled for spring 2025. The September audit collected 263.47 kg of waste, consisting of 94% sand/silt, 4.7% organic material, and 0.6% plastic.

gearing up for winter

Although the start of winter is still a couple months away, the Town's Transportation Division has officially begun its preparations for the snowy season ahead.

This is a busy time of year for the Transportation Division, the team responsible for maintaining BWG's road and sidewalk network. Every year following the Labour Day weekend, the team begins their transition into fall and winter mode – this includes fall street sweeping, removing summer equipment from dump trucks and sidewalk machines, attaching wing plows, calibrating material spreaders, and ensuring all equipment is in good running order for the season ahead.

The town has over 30 pieces of snow removal equipment including 13 plow trucks and 8 sidewalk machines. Nearly all the equipment is dual purpose and we own and operate them throughout the entire year.

Service Standards

BWG's road network includes arterial, collector, and local roads. Each road is assessed into one of these three categories based on road class under the MMS (O. Reg. 239/02: Minimum Maintenance Standards for Municipal Highways), annual daily traffic determined through traffic counts, and the presence of schools/emergency services. During storm events, all arterial roads receive priority servicing (like Holland Street, Bridge Street, Dissette Street, and Melbourne Drive). Collector roads are next on the schedule and include main roadways through neighbourhoods (like Maplegrove Avenue, Britannia Avenue, and Miller Park Avenue), followed by local roads which comprise all other roadways and courts. Sidewalks are also prioritized in the same manner.

The Town has three scheduled shifts throughout the winter months. The early shift road crew starts at 4:00 am; the sidewalk, walkway, and laneway crew starts at 6:00 am;

and the day shift starts at 7:00 am. During an average snowfall of 5-10cm, roads are typically cleared by 12:00 pm, followed by the sidewalk crew at 2:00 pm. There are, of course, always areas that require touching up, including wide corners, courts, and other areas that may have previously been blocked. Following significant snow events, staff also collect and remove bulk snow from the downtown core, courts, and other areas where snow storage is an issue.

Application Material

Once cleared of snow, sidewalks are treated using a 50/50 blend of salt and sand, to support the breakdown of ice and provide additional grip when walking along the sidewalk. Sand, with 4% salt, is applied to low-traffic roads, line roads, and gravel roadways. The remaining areas are given a treated salt that includes an activator to help the salt work faster, longer, and in colder temperatures. Treated salt is bright blue in colour and concentrated, allowing a lower rate of application - approximately 30% less as compared to regular salt - and limiting trips to reload material. The operations staff monitor the weather four times daily using radar and road temperature sensors on equipment to verify that material rates will work effectively while not over spreading.

Snow Clearing Tips

The Town's winter parking restrictions are in place to ensure our snow clearing crew can provide a high quality and efficient service during winter storms. Although the restrictions are not enforced during the daytime, it is recommended to move your car from the roadway and onto your driveway during winter storms, to allow the plows to clean the full width of the roadway. If the roads are not cleared back to the curb each time, catch basins may become blocked and could flood during warmer temperatures. Another rule of thumb to follow is to clear a space to the left end of your driveway so that when the snow plow comes down your street, it pushes most of the snow into that cleared space and not at the end of your driveway.

Reporting an Incident/Complaint

The most efficient way to report a snow clearing-related complaint or concern is through the myBWG App or Report an Issue Form on our website. Submissions are sent directly to the Town's Transportation team for review and staff can respond as needed. The Town also uses a snowline for concerns, compliments, and complaints.
